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ON DUTY WITH THE HOSPITAL VISITING TEAM

The health and welfare of the Club's members is an important part of that membership – and this is what prompted Toni Marchioni to approach Club President Brian Simpson in 2004 with a proposal to set up a hospital visiting group.

The proposal was that an appointed team make regular visits to members in hospital on behalf of the Club. Brian Simpson liked the idea and told Toni to go ahead and set up a proposal for doing so. The upshot has been a dedicated group of volunteer members doing just that over the years. Since then, the team has made an average of 20 - 25 visits to members in hospital a month.

The team is normally made up of four people, usually two couples, who do month and month about. Names of Club members in hospital are given to them by the HWMC office – the team cannot accept casual notice from others. The current team is made up of Toni and May, and Lis and Peter Karl. Previous team volunteers have been Joyce and Wally Blair, and Fred and Hannah Subritzky. This is Toni and May's 14th year on operations (pardon the pun), with Lis and Peter around 6 years. The team are volunteers who are happy to give their time to such a worthy and caring cause.

Visits are usually made once or possibly twice a week, whereby all known members in hospital are called on. Going to the high dependency unit can be an uncertain exercise, in that the team cannot always go in if other visitors are at the bedside of the members there. The number of visitors there is strictly adhered to – maximum of two at any one time.

If a ward patient is away from their room at the time of the visit or it is not suitable for the team to go in, a "sorry we missed you" card is left.

The team's main port of call is Waikato Hospital, however they also visit Club members in Braemar,

Southern Cross, Cascades and Hilda Ross hospitals, plus various rest homes. Sometimes they phone members at home if they are being cared for there.

What are the secrets of successful hospital visiting? Empathy with the patient, short stays (usually no more than half an hour), a listening ear and – very important – discretion.

What is a good conversation-starter? The weather (of course), the views from the hospital (if appropriate), and what's happening at HWMC (discretion again – no gossip!).

It just may be that occasionally they are the only visitors some folk have – and it goes without saying that if Club members in hospital prefer not to receive visitors, their privacy will be respected totally.

In summary:

if you or a family Club member is about to be, or has been, admitted to hospital and you would like to be called on by the HWMC team:

- notify the HWMC office of the member's name, ward and approximate length of time in hospital, and if they wish to be visited
- the office will pass the name on to the "on call" visiting team
- the team will visit during the appropriate time
- if the time in hospital is scheduled for at least a week, the office will arrange a care package of either fruit or toiletries, or flowers.

New Restaurant at HWMC
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THE WALL

For some time the HWMC Executive has looked at ways of separating the Club's music entertainment/dance floor and the bar/leaner areas so members and patrons can enjoy both areas without noise disruption from the other.

In the past when big rugby matches or other sporting events of interest were being shown on TV, the live music overwhelmed the TV sound. So the entertainers were asked to stop playing, play quietly, or were programmed around the events.

This put those who came for the music and dancing at a disadvantage. The situation was a Catch 22 one for the Club's organising personnel.

The current solution has been a floor-to-ceiling wall erected between the two areas. The stylish wall of light-coloured wood and large glass panels enables members to see both ways throughout the Club, without disruptive noise interference. It has also created an area on the bar side for pleasant seating arrangements for those who do not wish to use the leaners.

So far feedback has been positive, with several rugby games on TV broadcast while live bands were playing in the music entertainment area.

In keeping with the wall design, the gaming entrances have also had glass partitions fitted to define the area more as well as giving more privacy while patrons are using the machines.

THE QUIZMASTER



Meet Luke Pallesen, Duty Manager, Quizmaster and Housie Man ...

He started working at HWMC in 2014 after some years at the Sky Casino Hamilton. He has used his skills to run the popular Tuesday night quizzes and also organises the regular Tuesday housie afternoons held at The Pavilion.

Luke was appointed a Duty Manager in September 2017.

Here is his account of how the quizzes and housie work

WEEKLY QUIZ/TRIVIA

“A couple of years ago former Duty Manager Theo and I were running a weekly quiz where we got the questions from a company that sets up ready-made quizzes. We found that we couldn’t get the participation numbers we would like as teams had to commit to staying at the club past 9pm on a Tuesday night. After some discussion, Ken, Theo and I decided we would shorten the quiz and write it ourselves. Theo and I wrote the quiz together for the first few weeks after which I took over entirely.

I use a variety of means to get the questions, whether it be hearing a fun fact from people, television or radio. Sometimes I’ll pull up questions myself from my own interest in sports, movies and music etc. I always try to include topical questions from the last week’s news and events, and also try to get in New Zealand-related questions to give it a local flavour. Any other questions I source from various trivia websites.

There have been some regular teams attending over the last year - they include ‘Bads’, ‘Brilliant Bowlers’, ‘Sex on a Stick’, ‘Top Notch’ and ‘The Knights of the Round Table’. Other teams enter from time to time – sometimes there have been around 8 – 10 teams having a go. The quizzes are always well-contested by the teams and a prize goes to the weekly winners.”

HOUSIE/BINGO

“As far as I can recall the idea for holding housie afternoons was Ken’s. I volunteered to run it as I have had previous experience running the bingo at Sky City Casino.

The calling is done by an automated system controlled through a laptop, and that plays out over the speaker system.


Prizes are dependent on how many people come along as we pay out a percentage of the takings each week. We play 30 games of normal housie with prizes ranging between \$3 and \$25. We have a one-off game called Super Housie where the tickets cost more but players can win \$50 - \$100 from the one game.

The number of players attending is generally around 20 to 25, but there’s always room for more. The bigger the crowd, the bigger the prizes.”

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CHE ORTON

A MUSICIAN OF NOTE



Che Orton is a familiar name and star performer at HWMC. He and his band play regular Saturday night slots there every few months, as well as several solo appearances each year by Che. He is a popular performer at the 60 Plus sub section's Mid Year and Christmas Lunches.

What do we know about Che and his career?

Firstly, he was born in Thames, lived in Paeroa till he was five, then the family moved to Hamilton.

At the age of fifteen Che Orton, with guitar in hand, was known amongst those who knew him for doing a cool-dude Elvis impersonation as a bit of a joke. However when he was invited to dress up and perform three of The King's songs at the popular Drifters Rock'n'Roll Club's birthday party hop one year, he was to find that things took a serious turn – from that one show he picked up work for various events all over New Zealand. From a kid who loved music but had had no musical training, he was to become one of the country's most well-known and popular artists and songwriters in the rock'n'roll and country music genres.

Sixteen or so years later, that boy who grew up in the Waikato performs throughout New Zealand on a regular basis at RSA's, Cossie and Workingmen's clubs. Each weekend sees him "somewhere" in the country and he does between 80 – 90 shows a year.

Che's Elvis tribute shows are well-known, and as he says "a lot of fun". He is arguably New Zealand's top Elvis impersonator. He has also been part of Bee Gees tribute shows not only throughout New Zealand, but in Las Vegas USA two years in a row, playing the role of Robin Gibb. The Las Vegas shows draw huge sell-out crowds, as befit this glittering city that bills itself the Entertainment Capital of the World.

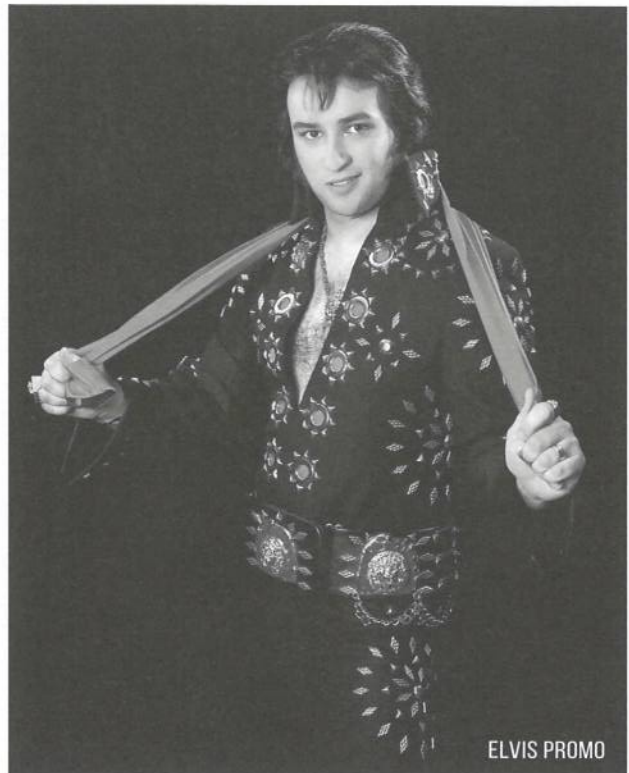
Other overseas gigs have been in USA's Phoenix and Texas, Australia, Samoa and Blackpool, England.

His recordings include:

- "A Big Hunk O' Love" in 2012 which showcases some great rock'n'roll covers, and a tribute to The King "I Want to Be Elvis Tonight"
- In 2013 he recorded his first single in Nashville, his own song "Boogie Woogie All Night Long". It featured superb backing musicians, and was a hint of things to come from the young singer himself
- 2015 saw him again in Nashville recording his own song "You're the Reason" which he wrote for his wife Lucy. This song can be heard on NZ's The Breeze radio station
- He recorded the "Songs from Nashville" EP in Nashville in 2016, which includes five of his own songs

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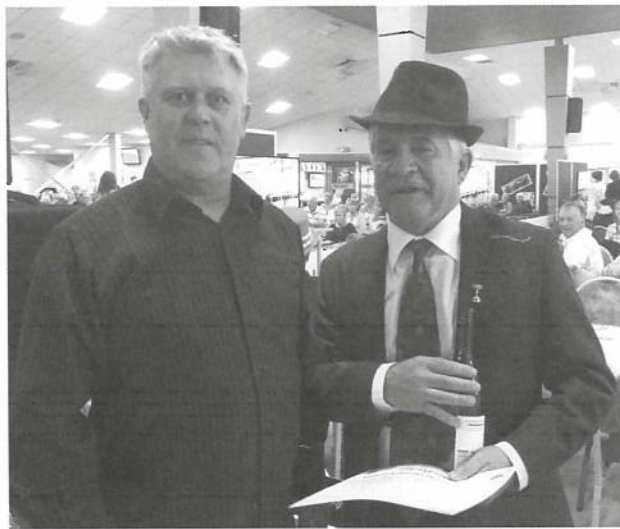
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MELBOURNE CUP DAY RUNS A GREAT FIELD AGAIN AT HWMC

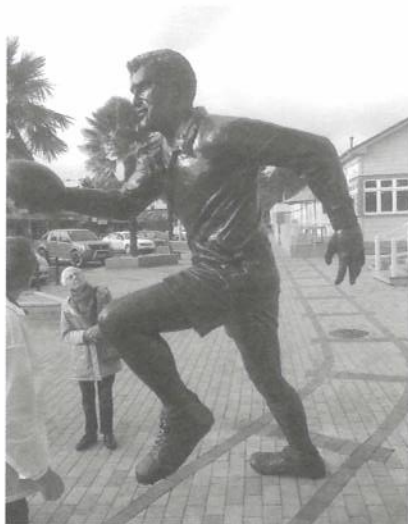
Our Christmas Luncheon at HWMC was again well attended and everyone enjoyed the festive fare and entertainment.

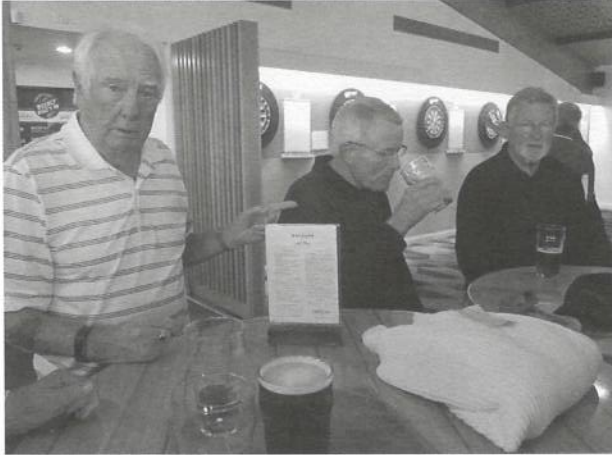

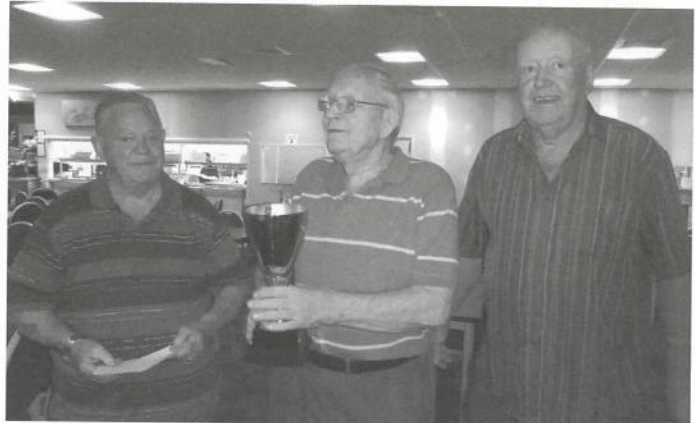

If you want to know more we meet the last Monday of the month in the dining room of the Club - come and join us, or talk to any of our current members Membership fee is \$10 per year.

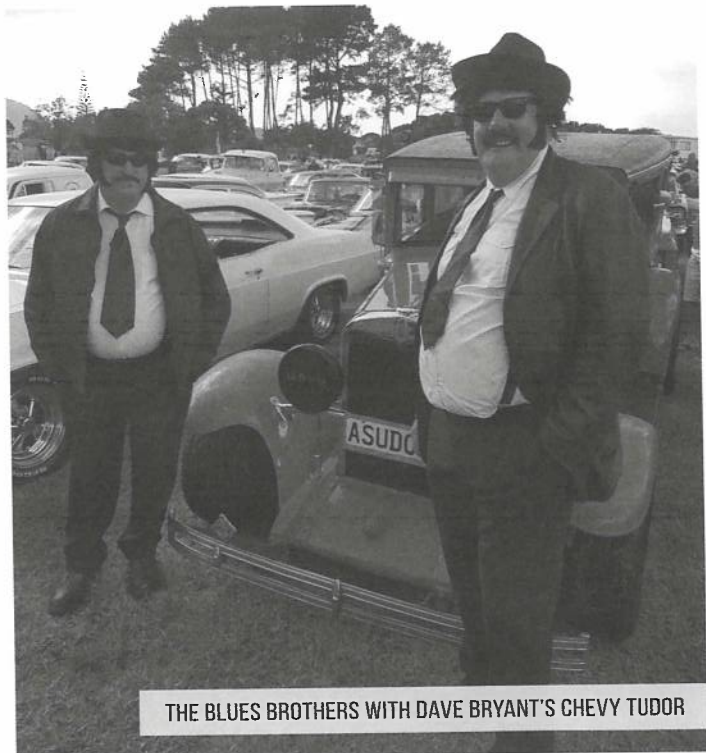

HWMC PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2018

Membership remains constant at over 7000 and pleasing to note the large number of renewals being paid very promptly. Our management team decided to delay posting subscription notices to save some postage expense. This worked very well as many of our members are aware of subscription due date and simply paid at the office or online prior to receiving their subscription notice. I encourage you to do likewise next year and save us even more money.

You will note that we have reported a deficit from operations of \$18,680 compared with \$68,589 and \$45,192 the previous two years, all deficits after allowance for depreciation. This year an additional \$25,000 depreciation was allowed on new restaurant assets with no corresponding income stream, the new restaurant was not yet operational. Had that not been the case the Catering a/c would have produced a similar result to last year and the overall result would have been a small profit. We look forward to opening the new restaurant, if not by the time you read this then very soon thereafter.

We have recently been notified of price increases from our liquor suppliers, and with an impending excise increase it is likely the price of drinks will be adjusted mid-year.

Thanks to Club Manager Ken Marcum and his management team, you're doing a great job! Thanks also to Margaret and her admin team who do likewise.

Thanks to the entire Club staff for your work, we appreciate it.

Thanks to Vice-President Helen Wood-Rowe, Treasurer Roger Donaldson and the rest of the executive committee for their time and effort. The executive committee has worked well together to ensure the Club remains a leader in its industry sector. To this end we have formulated a Strategic Plan to guide us over the coming years. The formulation of the Strategic Plan was headed by Vice President Helen Wood-Rowe and I congratulate her on the production of a very valuable tool for the guidance of future Executives and Management. Although the foreword to the document is under my signature it too was scripted by Helen. You will find the Strategic Plan following this report.

Nominations for executive close midnight Saturday 2nd June 2018. Election of officers will take place on the Club's premises between the hours of 11.00 am and 7.00 pm on Saturday 16th, Monday 18th and Tuesday 19th June 2018. As always, I urge you to show your interest and vote.

B Simpson reminded everyone that they needed to be a financial member of the Hamilton Workingmen's Club to be in attendance.

TRIBUTE TO DECEASED MEMBERS:

A moment of silence was observed as a tribute to members who had passed away during the year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

B Simpson started his address to the members by mentioning that he hoped they had all received their yearbook publication and had read his report. He stated that the Club had faced a dilemma a week out from the normal posting date as the printing press at the printers caught fire and caused a delay in distribution. Once the printers saw the cost to them for delay they moved with extraordinary speed to get them out. Anyone who has not yet received it please see reception for a copy. There are also copies available here today for those that need them.

B Simpson stated he hoped that everyone had read his report and had an opportunity to go over the financial report as well. B Simpson gave an overview of the

accounts. He outlined some of the obstacles suffered in hospitality and in Clubs in general and what we are doing to cope with these and move forward. He stated that our reports show Profit & Loss Losses which take into account depreciation which is a book entry only. We have \$200,000.00 in cash flow positive which allows us to still pay our bills on time which is not always the case for some people in our industry at the moment. We are aware that doing the same old same old gets the same results and we cannot just do that so we are moving forward with our building stage 3 of the restaurant. Tenders are about to be received and we will open hopefully late in the year. Rest assured the Committee is paying attention and not just continuing on hoping for the best with what we have. Discussion was had around costs of transport and entertainment. Alternate options are being trialed in these areas. B Simpson thanked the staff for providing a great experience when people visit the Club.

B Simpson asked if there were any questions regarding the President's Report or financial statements from the floor.

Winston Sorenson (0352) asked to speak regarding the financial statements. He asked what is being done or put in place to lessen the losses at the Pavilion as far as the gaming. Also what is the position on the repayments of the loans for the Club. B Simpson replied that the Pavilion shows a loss year on year, which is quite historical, and the reason for that is that it is a stand alone building which is easy to attribute expenses to. Most of the expenses are made up of Electricity and Greenkeeper's wages. There is also about \$30000 worth of depreciation. It is easy to show the Pavilion as a stand alone account but it needs to be seen as a Club asset. Although it shows a loss it is possibly still responsible for some avenues of revenue received through the main club and not really credited to the fact those people that use the Pavilion often end up at the main club spending their money. We are trying to use the Pavilion for more functions. The loss is not significant against the whole of the accounts. The gaming was retained for many years with the hope that we would find another venue

for the gaming machines where they could produce some significant income. We have been unable to find a venue and we have in fact relinquished our licence for those gaming machines and they are being dismantled and removed. B Simpson stated that at this stage we have not put a repayment plan in place as we are still borrowing to finish the final stage of the restaurant. Once that expense is sorted out discussions will be held with financial advisors to fix our repayments in mortgage type situations. This should be clearer in our financial reports next year. B Simpson stated that H Wood-Rowe is putting together a strategic plan for the Club and part of that plan will be our philosophy around debt and repayment.

This strategic plan is the first of many initiatives that the committee and management will implement to demonstrate our commitment to ensuring an ongoing positive experience and long tenure for the Club.

BACKGROUND

Registered as an Incorporated Society on 30 September 1955 as Hamilton and District Working Men's Club Incorporated, we subsequently changed to Hamilton Workingmen's Club Incorporated on 5 August 1974.

Establish solely for the membership of men over the age of 21, women were permitted entry only in special and exceptional circumstances. Women were afforded the opportunity to join as members in 1995 and in 2015 junior members were included. Women now make up 44% of Club membership and we currently have five junior members.

Formerly sited in Harwood Street in the Hamilton CBD, the Club recognised the risks and limitations associated with the location and purchased and moved to Commerce Street/King Street in 1996. This and subsequent surrounding land purchases have provided the Club with the opportunity for expansion as facility needs have required.

We have the largest club membership in the Waikato/Thames Valley region and in terms of membership we are the third largest in NZ.

Hamilton Workingmen's Club (Inc)
For the year ended 31 March 2018

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Hamilton Workingmen's Club (Inc) is a chartered club incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. The club provides recreational facilities as a fellowship and social club for the use and welfare of its members. The financial statements of Hamilton Workingmen's Club (Inc) are special purpose financial statements.

Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The special purpose financial statements of Hamilton Workingmen's Club (Inc) have been prepared in accordance with the stated accounting policies adopted by the Executive Committee.

These special purpose financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost.



Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of the Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position have been applied:

Revenue

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis as underlying goods and services are provided.

Stock on Hand

Inventories are recognised at lower of cost and net realisable value, determined on a first-in first-out basis. There is no damaged or obsolete stock.

Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are recognised at estimated realisable value.

Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are recognised at Cost less aggregate depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007. Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets are taken into account in determining the operating result for the year.

- Land 0% DV
- Building 1% SL
- Leasehold Improvements 10% DV
- Plant and Equipment 10 – 50% DV & 20 – 50% SL
- Furniture and Fittings 10% DV & 20% SL
- Land Improvement 1% SL

Income Tax

No liability from income tax arises on the basis that the Club is a non-profit entity that trades within the circle of its membership.

Goods and Services Taxation

Revenues and expenses have been recognised in the financial statements exclusive of GST. All items in the Statement of Financial Position are stated net of GST except for receivables and payables which are stated inclusive of GST.

Comparatives

Certain comparative information has been reclassified in order to provide a more appropriate basis for comparison.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those from previous financial statements.

12. Financial Instruments

Financial instruments which potentially subject the entity to credit risk consist of bank balances.

The carrying value of financial instruments as stated at 31 March 2018 is a reasonable estimate of fair value.

13. Term Liabilities

The club has granted a registered first mortgage in favour of the ANZ. As at balance date borrowings in respect of this liability totalled \$128,964 (2017: \$155,487), \$24,832 (2017 \$96,613), \$69,778 (2017 \$169,701), \$1,255,903 (2017 \$1,255,867), \$1,004,722 (2017 \$1,004,694, \$653,069 (2017 \$651,810) respectively.

The current portion of term liabilities relates to principal that is to be repaid within the next financial year. Included in this figure is \$3,510,270 which is anticipated will be transferred to a fixed period loan when the Restaurant project is completed.

The ANZ Bank line of credit is repayable on demand, however, it is not anticipate that the loan will be repaid in the next year. Interest is reviewed every 90 days - finance rate plus margin of 1.75%.

14. Capital Commitments

The Club has no capital commitments as at 31 March 2018 (2017: \$500,000).

15. Contingent Liabilities

The Club has no contingent liabilities as at 31 March 2018 (2017 Nil).

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
